NTrak Track Question

Here is an email I received looking for suggestions for laying track. I forwarded it to Bob Pawlak and here is both the request for help and the reply from Bob with his suggestion.

"A member from Brooklyn NTrak. I thought I might use this venue to ask an NTrak Track question.

I should have finished tacking and gluing down my roadbed this weekend and would like to start laying track. I'll be using Peco Flextrack as well as Peco Electrofrog turnouts.

I've been browsing online and there seem to be ENDLESS ways of attaching track from "Liquid Nails" to "Household Goo" to "Woodland Scenics" adhesives.

[Silly little me was was going to just tack them down with small atlas nails over some elmers glue, the same way I'd done for years. Do any of you have any different suggestions?

I was also thinking of adding short, standard, atlas tracks (maybe the 2" one) to the outside of each track because those get beatup on instillation and can easily be replaced. And I will be very gentle in attaching my switches (perhaps only a tack or smidge of elmers far from any moving parts.)

I'm also assuming that I can do all of my wiring after I glue track as I'm relatively handy with a soldering iron.

Thanks for any and all input, The New Guy

PS. I may still nail and elmers unless some of y'all tell me it's a truly horrible idea."

Hi Matt,

If you ask 10 guys, you will probably get 10 different answers. Here is mine.

I asked someone I knew who had been at it a long time. He recommended Plyo-Bond glue. It is most readily available in small (3 oz) bottles at some hardware stores but I once bought a quart of it on line. It smells nasty but I like the results and have always used it for gluing track to cork or track directly to plywood. I first put a coat on the cork or plywood and let it dry for a little while. Then I put a coat on the track and let it dry a little while. Then I put the track on the cork or plywood. It is similar to contact cement but not the same because it allows you to move the two pieces to final alignment after contact. For example, suppose it is a piece of straight track. After you put the two pieces together, you can put a straight edge along the edge of the ties and maneuver the track to get it straighter than when you first put it down.

I don't like nails, pins, tacks, etc. I use what I call "snake weights" that I built especially for gluing track down. I bought a bag of buck shot - maybe 25 lbs at a sporting

goods store that is sold to people who reload shot gun shells with the stuff. It is not exactly lead, but very heavy in little balls. I then took an old piece of sheet and used a sewing machine to make an 18" long by 1-1/4" diameter bag and filled it with the buck shot and sewed the end of the bag closed. Don't stuff the bag too tight so it will be very flexible. Make more than one bag so you will have enough length for a 3' long section of track. After you glue your track, plop the "snake weight" on the track to hold it in place. Don't put so much glue down that it comes up through the ties or you will glue the snake weight to the track. The snake weight will handle most any shape of curved track.

I have a 12' x 3' Ntrak module I call "Bridges Canyon" that (believe it or not) has about 240' of Micro Engineering code 55 flex track and switches on it. I didn't use cork at all to save weight. I glued the track directly to 1/8" plywood pieces which I then glued to pink foam insulation. After a while, I didn't let the glue dry much and I put ballast down mostly between the rails and then used the snake weights. Later I added more ballast as necessary, mostly not between the rails.

From Prototype to Model by Bob Pawlak

Last January, I was driving from the convention hotel to the "Big E" on Sunday morning following the Winterfest banquet the night before. I was happy that the work of the banquet was finished and I could look forward to a relaxing day of running trains and seeing the Amherst Show.

There is a railroad yard which parallels the road for several blocks where I usually see dull, rusted, and weathered full scale freight cars. I was, therefore, somewhat shocked to see the pair of cars pictured below because they looked brand new or at least fresh from the paint shop with striking colors. I pulled off the road to have a closer look. Fortunately, I had my camera and the two cars were spotted such that it was easy to take a picture of them. I thought it was unusual that a tank car and box car would both be painted in such a flashy color scheme with identical logos and be coupled together.



One of the logos on the tank car said "Safety Train, The Firefighters Education and Training Foundation." I figure the pair of cars was on some sort of tour and safety training mission. As I got back in the car, I thought to myself, "Those two cars would look great as Micro-Trains models!"

A few days later I sent an e-mail to Eric Smith of Micro-Trains Line with photos of the two cars attached. I told him where I had seen the cars, suggested they would make great models, and thanked him again for being a sponsor of Winterfest 2009.

As the year went by, I proceeded to forget about the cars until I got my copy of the Micro-Trains Line Micro-News with pictures of the new releases for September, 2009. Lo and behold, there was the blue and red tank car! The write up said, "It was built in August 1972, serviced in March 2008 and runs on Barber Roller Bearing trucks. Tank car 72223 is part of a consist of cars that travel regionally each year to provide free safety training to



emergency responders. The program is provided by TRANSCAER (Transportation Community Awareness and Emergency Response), a voluntary outreach effort focusing on training communities to prepare and respond to a possible hazardous material transportation incident in partnership with companies, in this case DOW Chemicals." I had to have one of these cars so I quickly bought one. The picture above shows the model tank car from about the same angle as the prototype picture. The picture below is a picture of the box car with the same paint scheme and logos as the tank car.

About six weeks later a package arrived from Micro Trains with a complimentary copy of the same Dow tank car and a note that read in part: "This is our way of saying thank you for your contribution and making it possible for Micro-Trains to release this authentic scale model. Micro-Trains wishes to thank everyone involved, whether you are a modeler, rail fan, collector or source of prototype data." That was a nice surprise!

My prediction is that the matching box car will eventually be a new release by Micro-Trains. The morale of this story is: keep your camera handy and send suggestions for new release models to N-scale manufacturers.

Vandalized Connecticut Eastern Railroad Museum Seeks funds to rebuild

WILLIMANTIC, Conn. — The Connecticut Eastern Railroad Museum is working to raise money to fix **damage done by vandals Nov. 3**, the north-central *Connecticut Journal Inquirer* has reported. Museum officials fear the damage tally could reach as high as \$100,000.

Vandals broke windows and spray-painted graffiti on museum displays; Willimantic police say they're investigating, but have made no arrests. The museum held an open house last weekend to allow the public to see the damage firsthand, and began its fundraising campaign there. It will hold a "goods and services benefit auction" Friday, and will hold its normal fundraising event, its fall train show, Nov. 15 at Windham High School.
